## LOCAL SHERIFF'S REPORT

Tillamook County has been experiencing a high level of heroin overdoses including one death. Due to persistence and long hours, Sheriff's Office Detectives have arrested three individuals. The investigation continues and is a high priority; I expect more arrests soon.

Our budget process for 2012/13 is complete; we have a balanced budget, and the Sheriff's Office will maintain the current level of personnel and services to Tillamook County.

While the Japan Earthquake and Tsunami has heightened the preparedness awareness along the U.S. West Coast, so too has preparedness awareness, training, and education been very active in Tillamook County. The Sheriff's Office Emergency Management Director, Gordon McCraw, has been working with the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI) to do outreach in the communities along Tillamook County's coastline. The outreach in a particular area culminates with a Full Scale Community Evacuation Exercise where the residents are encouraged to walk to their Evacuation Site with their 72 hour Disaster Kit, to see what it would be like and how long it would take. In previous years, similar activities have taken place in the North County areas as well as the South County areas. This year they are concentrating on the Tillamook Bay area. On March 24th an exercise was conducted in the Cape Meares to Cape Lookout area including

Oceanside and Netarts. This exercise was a huge success with over 700 participants, volunteers, and public safety personnel involved. It included many visitors and part-time residents. For example, Cape Meares has only 50 full-time residents but had 3 times that number report to the local evacuation site. The following exercise, conducted on May 5th, included the cities and communities between Barview south through Garibaldi to Bay City. This was also a success with over 380 participants. The safety and success of these events was a result of the many partners and agencies that assisted in all aspects of the events, which included the Tillamook County Sheriff's Offices Emergency Management, Search and Rescue, Patrol, Marine and Forest Personnel, DOGAMI, Civil Air Patrol, Red Cross, Amateur Radio Operators, many different local Fire District and Volunteer Fire personnel, other local city police agencies and Public Works Departments, ODOT, Coast Guard, and several other Emergency Volunteer Organizations. There are already other exercises planned in more areas (associated with the DOGAMI outreach and others) through the rest of this year.

The Sheriff Office received two new Patrol cars this year. We were excited to learn that instead of getting Crown Victorias anymore on State bid, we would be receiving new Police Interceptors. The Interceptors are based on the new Ford Taurus and are designed to handle the rigors of police work with a strong V6 engine, better gas mileage, and come "road ready" with lights and equipment already installed.

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## TILLAMOOK PUD UPDATE:

### WIND POWER

Anyone flying into Portland on a clear day or driving east to Pendleton and beyond will notice a change in our landscape. There are hundreds of operating windmills on ridge tops just east of the Columbia Gorge Scenic Area. Each windmill generates between two and five megawatts of electricity. A megawatt is enough juice to power about 600 average homes.

Currently there are about 4,000 megawatts from wind operating on the Northwest power grid with another 2,000 MW scheduled to come on line in the next two years. That's the equivalent of five new Bonneville dams. So what does that mean for ratepayers and local utilities?

Tillamook PUD, like most of the nearly 140 other customers of the Bonneville Power Administration, receives nearly all its electricity from the hydro system on the Columbia and Snake Rivers, the nuclear plant in the Richland area of SE Washington State, and now the windmills.

Some information regarding the wind industry will help explain the changing landscape and utility industry.

Wind, of course, has been a source of energy throughout history. People have powered their sailing ships, ground their grain, and dried their clothes with wind for a good long time. But the new generation of windmills is much larger (some are as tall as a football field is long), very efficient and much stronger. Europe has accepted the new wind power source for electricity generation for a number of years. It's clean, emits no CO<sub>2</sub>, and wind is free. Sounds like the way to go.

However, like most things, there are some issues. The current designs can safely operate only when the wind speed is between 7 and about 45 miles per hour. And in eastern Oregon and Washington that's only about one third of the time. And there's no way to control when that time occurs.

That means that there must be sufficient reserve capacity from other generating sources like hydro and fossil fuels to be brought on line on very short notice. Prior to the current development of wind turbines, the Northwest's electrical grid was "balanced" every hour, meaning that supply was adjusted to meet demand across the region.

Now, BPA is moving toward balancing the system every five minutes. There have been times in the recent past where wind generation was on line at nearly 100 percent capacity and dropped to zero across the entire region in about 30 minutes. That's not only a huge operational and engineering challenge, but also a practical and political problem regarding river flows, navigation, irrigation and more across the western states.

A second major problem, which may solve itself over time, is that the wind industry's business model is built on various federal and state tax credits and subsidies in addition to the sale of electricity. No generation, no money. So when wind generation is curtailed by BPA to balance the system during times of heavy water runoff, even with replacement hydro power at no cost, the wind industry loses money. That, of course, turns into a full employment act for lawyers. And that may ultimately lead to additional costs which become part of the rate structure of BPA which then becomes part of the rate base cost for your Tillamook PUD.

The wind industry certainly has much promise. It's here to stay. But like the evolution of the light bulb, the challenge is to get more light than heat.

Three 8th-graders graduated this June. In the last several months, these students and their 6th-grade classmates have done some wonderful projects. When I compare what they are doing to what I did as a middle-school student, I feel particularly proud of how our Olders teacher, Amy Henderson, has given them space to learn about themselves, think deeply about their studies and serve the larger community.

Her students and their work formed the basis of the Master's thesis Amy wrote for the degree she completed at Prescott College this spring in Youth and Community Art. She took them through a series of thoughtful art, writing and research explorations that produced provocative autobiographical paintings.

For their life science studies, they contributed to the all-school Field Guide to the Neskowin Valley Watershed (you may have seen it for sale at the NVS booth at the Neskowin Farmer's Market), and for their Oregon history unit they created a video on some of the economic drivers of Tillamook County.

They played parts in a spring drama production featuring four condensed Shakespeare plays performed to full houses at NVS and the Lincoln City Cultural Center. Olders students also worked with adult mentors to investigate careers that interest them, including wildlife biologist, Emergency Medical Technician, and pastry chef. They presented their experience and research to an audience.

They also reached out to the community through visits to an eldercare center, where they wrote memoirs with the residents over several visits. They both got into shape and contributed to the Tillamook Animal Shelter through pledges on a run they organized between NVS and the Otis Cafe.

The school is open all summer for visits by prospective families; feel free to drop by and say hello!

First, we conducted our Title I business – an explanation to those present what our federal funds do for us, why we need parent involvement and how parents can do that. Not too many audience members spoke during this part of the evening as they were eating a delicious lasagna and salad dinner prepared by Ken Henson of the Pelican Pub. While we were eating, our district's food service manager, Ruth Kiser, came for a brief visit as she had another event to attend. Ruth was our special honoree of the evening. Diane Wilkinson and LuAnn Anderson of SMART Reading introduced the community members who read every Tuesday with our Kindergarten through 2nd graders. These volunteers help our young readers to learn that our community values the enjoyment of reading books. Next, Kim Cavatora presented our Art Literacy volunteers. Kim and her husband Mark design incredible art lessons that help our students understand the importance of famous artists and then magically assist the children to create inspired works of art. The Community Arts Project sponsors this program. We are incredibly blessed to have Kim and Denise Clausen provide this unique learning opportunity. A raffled box of art

supplies was won by an appreciative 1st grader, Graeden Dunn.

Our classroom volunteers were introduced next. They provided extraordinary help to our classroom teachers this year. We were happy to have Jo Rack from the Backpack Program there, too, along with some of the volunteers who stuff the backpacks and faithfully deliver them. Based on parent requests, this program provides a backpack of free food for children for the weekend.

Susan O'Leary (1st grade teacher) and Teri Butler (instructional assistant), resurrected, rehabilitated, revamped and restored our school's garden this year. Teri, with remarkable energy, does this as a volunteer after her work day has ended. The children really enjoy going out to the garden and experiencing the thrill of growing food. They are also working on improving deer protection at the garden, too.

Field trips aligned to instructional standards are a highlight of every spring. Our trips this year included the Oregon Coast Aquarium, the Oregon Zoo, Ft. Clatsop/Ft. Stevens, the Tillamook Forestry Center, and the tide pools at Cape Kiwanda. Our 3rd graders experienced Down By the Riverside at the Hoquarten Slough and our 4th graders enjoyed the Clean Water Festival at Camp Magruder near Twin Rocks.

Linda Oram and school bands journeyed to Kilchis House and to Five Rivers Assisted Living and Retirement Community in Tillamook to play for the residents. Ms. Oram, who is retiring after 25 years of serving children in South Tillamook County, will be missed. Our school had the pleasure of hosting the Nestucca High School Band on June 4 with guest conductor Mac Pimentel conducting. We learned that almost all of the band members had started their musical instrument careers with Ms. Oram at NVES.

Along with Linda Oram, we will miss these other staff as they leave us for new adventures: Dee Cherry, Bernetta Hanson, and Kathy Christensen. We wish them well. In the meantime, we have been very busy making plans for next year. We will be open for business for our community's children the day after Labor Day.

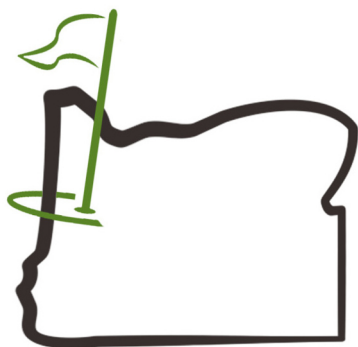
